Palaeolithic Stone Age

2.5 million years ago to 10,000BC

In the Old Stone Age, Britain was part of mainland Europe.

The first humans arrived in Britain around 800,000BC.

Homo sapiens (our ancient ancestors) arrived around 30.000BC.

Early Stone Age people lived in caves or very simple shelters. They made stone tools and survived by hunting and fishing.

Mesolithic Stone Age

10.000BC to 8000BC

During the Middle Stone Age, Britain was linked to Europe by a strip of land called Doggerland.

People in Britain began to set up camps along the British coast and on river banks, but moved often.

Hunter-gatherers often worked together to hunt, using spears and bows and arrows.

People also tamed wolves so they could work as hunting dogs and guard their camps.

Neolithic Stone Age

8000BC to 2500BC

Britain became an island after Doggerland was flooded around 6000BC.

During this period, people learned to farm and began to settle and live in small communities.

Neolithic people used flint, antler and bone to make tools, and developed the skill of making clay

Houses were typically built with wooden frames, but some like at Skara Brae were built with stone.

AD—Anno Domini = in the year of our Lord. AD is used to show dates after the birth of Jesus.
